A. Frances Johnson Writing Stories from Australian Pasts

10.30am-12.00pm SATURDAY George Kerferd Hotel, Mayday Hills Village, Albert Road Beechworth

There are many different ways of writing stories from our shared pasts. Sometimes writers create an illusion of period (Kate Grenville, Peter Carey, Hilary Mantel, Rohan Wilson, Tracy Chevalier etc). Other writers set out to draw attention to that illusion, and to the writing act as well, exposing visible seams between past and present, archival illusion and reality (Kim Scott, Doctorow, Julian Barnes and others).

With a focus on recent experiments in Australian literature, this class will expose participants to different ways of writing the past. The workshop will encourage participants to develop their own writing project, exploring ideas of multiple voice and metafiction alongside classic modes of scenework.

Myron Lysenko How to write Contemporary Haiku

The haiku is the perfect poem for the 21st century. Myron will discuss contemporary essential guidelines of haiku then guide you into putting your knowledge into practice by writing your own haiku. Contrary to popular belief the haiku does not contain 17 syllables in a 5-7-5 pattern. Rather it is a juxtaposition between two different images, capturing one moment of awareness.

The Cinema of 'the Short': a workshop on writing novellas

Originating in Italy during the Middle Ages, the novella form influenced the development of short stories and the novel throughout Europe. Contemporary Australian writers such as Helen Garner, Marion May Campbell, Chi Vu and Brian Castro have used the novella form to push and polish sentences, producing narratives of brevity, poetic precision and thematic complexity. This workshop will consider how to approach structural and thematic elements of writing a novella including characterisation, temporality, and the use of associated motifs to organise your novella's narrative design.

Amy Brown Writing for the Pre Teen and Young Adult Reader

This workshop will involve planning and beginning to write a piece of fiction aimed at a pre-teen or young adult reader. We will explore the conventions and challenges of writing for a younger audience, by reading and analysing a selection of classic and contemporary fiction. We will also discuss the best ways of submitting a pre-teen or young adult manuscript to a publisher. If you have a copy of a favourite novel from your childhood or young adulthood, bring it along.

Amy Brown is a New Zealand poet, novelist and teacher who now lives in Melbourne. In 2012 she completed a PhD on contemporary epic poetry at the University of Melbourne. Her first collection of poetry, The Propaganda Poster Girl, was shortlisted at the 2009 New Zealand Book

Awards. Her latest book, a contemporary epic poem titled The Odour of Sanctity was published in 2013. She is also the author of Pony Tales, a series of four children's novels published by HarperCollins.



Paddy Dewan has been writing poetry since he went to Ireland as a Paediatric Surgical trainee in 1988. His poems reflect his travels conducting surgery in many developing countries, the rough and tumble of life, love, hope, family, inspirational characters and injustice. Born in

Cobram, raised in Wangaratta, his heart resides at the original settlement site of the Dewan family in the Woolshed Valley, outside Beechworth.



Nola Firth is a writer and poet who grew up in Beechworth. Her first poetry chapbook, Even if the Sun, was published by Melbourne Poets Union in 2013. Nola received commendations in the 2015 Rhonda Jankovic Award for social justice poetry, the 2014 Melbourne Poets Union

International Poetry Prize, the 2012 and 2013 Castlemaine Poetry Prize and the 2013 Dangerously Poetic Byron Bay Writers Festival Prize. She is currently working on a biography of the Rev. Dr. Barry Marshall.



Geoff Galbraith is a long time Beechworth resident. He has told us that among other characteristics, he is a lover of people and a tired old traveller who tangles with words.



A. Frances Johnson is a lecturer in Creative Writing at the University of Melbourne. Her paintings have been exhibited in Australia and overseas, and her poetry has appeared in many anthologies including Best Australian Poems 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2013. Her 2007

novel, Eugene's Falls, retraces the wilderness journeys of colonial painter Eugene von Gerard. Her poetry collections are The Pallbearer's Garden (2008) and The Wind-up Birdman of Moorabool Street (2012) which received the 2012 Wesley Michel Wright Prize. She is currently working on a new book of poetry and a novel about Louise Girardin.



Anthony Lynch lives on the Bellarine Peninsula, Victoria, where he writes fiction, poetry and reviews. His work has appeared in newspapers, journals and anthologies, and been read on ABC Radio National. He is a sometime reviewer for The Australian and Australian Book Review, and

author of the short story collection Redfin (Arcadia) and the poetry collection Night Train (Clouds of Magellan). He works as an editor, and is the publisher for Whitmore Press.



Myron Lysenko is the author of six books of poetry, the latest a book of haiku. He teaches creative writing at Carlton Neighbourhood Learning Centre and the Woodend Neighbourhood House. He enjoys travelling into scenic places where he walks around writing haiku. Myron also

organises Chamber Poets, a monthly poetry reading in Woodend.



Born in Hamilton in western Victoria, in 1953, Shane Maloney is one of Australia's most popular novelists. His award-winning and much-loved Murray Whelan series-Stiff, The Brush-Off, Nice Try, The Big Ask, Something Fishy and Sucked In-has been published around the world. In

1996 The Brush-Off won the Ned Kelly Prize for Crime Fiction. In 2004 Stiff and The Brush-Off were made into telemovies, starring David Wenham as Murray Whelan. In 2009 Shane Maloney was presented with the Crime Writers' Association of Australia Lifetime Achievement Award. He lives in Melbourne.



Jean Memery was born in Beechworth and was taught by the Brigidine nuns at the local convent. She graduated from Melbourne University and taught English for more than 40 years, 20 of those in Darwin. Back in Beechworth now, she is living in her childhood

home, renovating, gardening and writing poetry for her friends.



Vivienne McWaters has long been passionate about history and when her family moved to Beechworth from Wangaratta her neighbour, Emma Bennett nee Wong told her that the old Chinese camp used to be located in the paddock behind the house. This information lead Vivienne

on an adventure that has lasted for over thirty years.



Eddie Paterson lectures in scriptwriting at the University of Melbourne. He is managing co-editor of Five Islands poetry press and the author of The Contemporary American Monologue, published by Bloomsbury in 2015. His forthcoming book of poems, Redactor, will be published by Whitmore Press in 2016.



Singer and songwriter, Marisa Quigley loves to engage her audience and has a unique capacity to translate her insightful stories into captivating lyrical journeys. She won female vocalist of the year at the 2007 Australian Blues Music Awards.



Lisa Ride enjoys writing poetry, but finds more fun in the delivery. Her first public recital was at WRAP Weekend, 2014. Since then, she has won Best Novice Writer at the Australian Bush Poetry competition in 2015 and was a state finalist in the Australian Poetry Slam.
